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Dear Faithful Parishioners,

Prologue from *A Hidden Wholeness* by Parker Palmer

There was a time when farmers on the Great Plains, at the first sign of a blizzard, would run a rope from the back door out to the barn. They all knew stories of people who had wandered off and been frozen to death, having lost sight of home in a whiteout while still in their own backyards.

Today we live in a blizzard of another sort. It swirls around us as economic injustice, ecological ruin, physical and spiritual violence, and their inevitable outcome: war. It swirls within us as fear and frenzy, greed and deceit, and indifference to the sufferings of others. We all know stories of people who have wandered off into this madness and been separated from their own souls, losing their moral bearings and even their mortal lives...

It is easy to believe that the soul — that life-giving core of human self, with its hunger for truth and justice, love and forgiveness — has lost all power to guide our lives. But the soul’s order can never be destroyed. It may be obscured by the whiteout. We may forget, or deny, that its guidance is close at hand. And yet we are still in the soul’s backyard, with chance after chance to regain our bearings.

In a couple of weeks, we will enter the season of Lent. There will be various opportunities as individuals and as a community for us to examine the ways in which we have been caught up in blizzards. There will also be various paths for us to find our way home. I invite you to take part in this journey. Whether it is through prayer, worship, study, fellowship, or solitude, be mindful of the blizzards in your life and be open to new possibilities that tie you back to the life and love of Christ.

This edition of the Messenger includes information about our Lenten offerings. Gabe and I will be co-leading a study using the book *The Sunflower* by Simon Weisenthal. Scott Tuomi is working with members of the choir to offer Compline every Sunday night during Lent. Gabe will walk the Stations of the Cross every Friday night using a bilingual service. And there will be a noontime Bible Study every Wednesday. Every opportunity is unique, and every opportunity is open to all.



March Holy Women, Holy Men: Geoffrey Anketell Studdert Kennedy

On March 8, we are asked to remember G.A. Studdert Kennedy, who was born in Leeds in 1883 and ordained a priest in the Church of England around the turn of the 20th century. After the first World War broke out, he volunteered to serve as a military chaplain to soldiers on the Western Front and witnessed many of the horrors of that war. Along with his spiritual counsel and comfort, Studdert Kennedy was famous for handing out Woodbine cigarettes, which earned him the nickname "Woodbine Willie." He emerged from the Great War a committed pacifist and Christian socialist and published many volumes of poetry and prose that inspired figures as diverse as Desmond Tutu and Jürgen Moltmann. He died in 1929. *May he rest in peace and rise in glory.* (Adapted from *Holy Women, Holy Men*)

Assistant Rector's Corner

I know it seems counter-intuitive, but Lent is one of my favorite seasons of the church year. Invariably, I find that settling into the practices and disciplines of the season helps me prune the wild growths of the old year to focus on the simplicity and fruitfulness of our common life in Christ. But I always start the season with the same question: What will I give up *this* year?

I have seen many Lents come and go, so I've given up everything from soda and sweets to meat and Facebook! Sometimes the fasting helps me distinguish my needs from my wants and refocus my attention on other things that matter, like intimacy with God and my neighbor. But often, I've also found that a season of principled deprivation encourages the growth of pride and leads to a binge after the Easter Vigil. Surely, that can't be the point of our observance.

So, this year, I'm trying a new discipline. Maybe you'd like to try it with me. In the spirit of St. Ignatius Loyola's *Spiritual Exercises*, I will commit to writing a brief *examen* at the end of each day. The *examen* is a period of prayer in which I remind myself of God's loving presence and guidance, thoughtfully review the moments of my day, and ask myself two questions: "For what moment today am I most grateful?" and "For what moment today am I least grateful?" Another way to phrase the questions is: "When was I most open to give and receive love today?" and "When was I most closed to giving and receiving love today?"

By keeping track of these movements of the Spirit and being mindful of my own inner landscape and how God may be working with me to bring me to greater joy and flourishing, over time I hope to find myself consoled and challenged, my mission clarified, and my relationship with God strengthened. For a great introduction to the *examen*, I recommend a book called *Sleeping with Bread: Holding What Gives You Life* by Dennis Linn, Sheilda Fabricant Linn, and Matthew Linn. Whatever Lenten discipline you chose, I pray the season will bring us all to an encounter with the Living Christ who walks with us and made the way of the cross to be the way of life.

As We Forgive: Lenten Book Study of Simon Wiesenthal's *The Sunflower*

Jesus taught us to pray, "Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us." What does it mean to forgive? And how do we forgive when the offense is so great it can hardly be comprehended? We will discuss these and similar questions in our Lenten Book Study on Simon Wiesenthal's *The Sunflower*, facilitated by Chris Craun and Gabe Lamazares.

From the dust cover: "While imprisoned in a Nazi concentration camp, Simon Wiesenthal was taken one day from his work detail to the bedside of a dying member of the SS. Haunted by the crimes in which he had participated, the soldier wanted to confess to — and obtain absolution from — a Jew. Faced with the choice between compassion and justice, silence and truth, Wiesenthal said nothing. But even years after the war had ended, he wondered: Had he done the right thing? What would you have done in his place? In this important book, 53 distinguished men and women respond to Wiesenthal's questions. They are theologians, political leaders, writers, jurists, psychiatrists, human rights activists, Holocaust survivors, and victims of attempted genocide in Bosnia, Cambodia, and China. Their responses, as varied as their experiences of the world, remind us that Wiesenthal's questions are not limited to events of the past... *The Sunflower* will challenge you to define your beliefs about justice, compassion, and human responsibility."

We'll meet for five Tuesdays starting March 15 at 6:30 pm in Nativity Hall for a simple soup supper followed by conversation and reflection. A sign-up sheet is on a clipboard in the Gallery. Please join us!

Stations of the Cross

Fridays are designated in the Prayer Book as days for special acts of discipline and devotion, especially in Lent. In that spirit, we'll gather on Friday evenings beginning March 18 at 6:30 pm in the Nave for Stations of the Cross, a brief, contemplative service symbolically walking The Way of the Cross with Christ. The service will be in English and Spanish.

Compline

Lent is a great time to make room for silence and restful contemplation in busy lives. To that end, every Sunday during Lent at 8:00 pm, the choir will be leading a chanted

Compline service with a special hymn or anthem each week. Compline is the church's "bedtime" prayer. Historically the last monastic prayer service of the day, this short, meditative service consists of set prayers helping the soul settle into night in the presence of God.

Youth & Families Invited to Join Clean-Water Trip to Nicaragua this Summer

I invite your family to consider joining the summer 2011 St. Michael's El Porvenir Clean Water delegation. This 10-day trip (July 9-18) is expressly designed for youth/young adults and their parents who will help bring clean water and sanitation to a small village where none existed before. This is an incredible opportunity to "do good" in the world, to get to know people from another culture, and to invest in your family and church community.

If you are in high school or college, or a parent of one of our youth, think about joining your friends on this trip. This July 9-18 trip is similar to one August and I joined two years ago. Youth and their families will help villagers build washing stations (laundry and shower facilities and dry wells) with access to clean water from simple pumps. "What surprised me most was seeing how normal living with bad water was for many people, and how they got sick and couldn't do anything about it," said August. El Porvenir (which means "The Future" in Spanish) has a 20-year record of bringing clean water to more than 100,000 rural Nicaraguans. Their stringent criteria require every participating community to be motivated and committed to protecting their clean-water supply.

Nicaragua is a beautiful country, and her people are very family-oriented, friendly, and graciously hospitable. "It was very cool to see the culture. There was a colonial city called Granada with huge, really old churches. And I liked swimming in a lake in an extinct volcano," said August.

The experience of working with and getting to know the folks in the San Lorenzo community was formational. "Everyone we met seemed happy, even though sometimes things were quite difficult for them," August added. I asked August what his favorite part of the trip was. He replied, "Feeling as though I and our group had done something to help the people of San Lorenzo. That felt really good."

Seeking Delegates to Diocesan Convention

Would you like to represent St. Michael's year at the 2011 Diocese of Oregon Annual Convention? In 2011, St. Michael's will send seven delegates to the Annual Convention in November, including five delegates and two alternates. Any St. Michael's member in good standing is eligible to be a convention delegate. A delegate represents St. Michael's at the convention. In addition to voting on the diocesan annual budget and electing representatives to the various governing bodies, delegates vote on a variety of new resolutions as well as changes to existing policy. Such resolutions could include voting on policies regarding such issues as same-gender blessings, Haitian relief, and environmental stewardship. In addition, delegates are charged with the responsibility of voting on any changes to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese such as reformulating the assessments paid annually by each congregation.

The Annual Convention begins on the evening on November 10 and continues through the afternoon of November 12, and it will be held in Salem this year. Due to a variety of commitments on the evenings of November 10 and 11, delegates may choose to stay overnight in Salem. Each delegate will be responsible for covering the cost of their overnight lodging, though some limited assistance will be available. Convention meals will be paid for by St. Michael's.

In addition to making a commitment to participating at Convention, all delegates and alternates are asked to attend the Metro East Convocation meetings. The Convocation meetings are an important part of a delegate's role, allowing them to be fully informed and prepared to best represent the St. Michael's community at the Annual Convention. The first Convocation meeting will be held here at St. Michael's on March 6 from 3:00-5:00 pm. There will be three additional Convocation meetings in preparation for the convention. Typically, there is a meeting in June and two in the fall, each lasting approximately two hours.

The Vestry will vote during their February 24 meeting to select who, from all interested parties, will represent St. Michael's at the convention.
