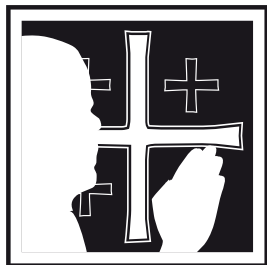

January Holy Women, Holy Men: Samuel Shoemaker

On January 31, we are asked to remember Samuel Shoemaker, an Episcopal priest who served as Rector of Calvary Church in New York City from 1925-1941. He brought to his work a passionate belief in the power of authentic testimony of the transforming power of Christ to change lives. During his tenure and with his spiritual guidance, a group of alcoholics began to meet at Calvary. This group would become the first Alcoholics Anonymous fellowship. Although Shoemaker did not create AA, he is widely recognized as a significant influence on the AA program and the spirituality of recovery.

Here are some quick facts about the NE Emergency Food Program from their website:

NE Emergency Food Program meets the urgent food needs of our north and northeast Portland neighbors while working to develop community solutions to secure access to adequate, affordable and healthy food. We ground our work in the belief that nutritious food is a basic human need and a building block for a healthy life of possibility.

NE Emergency Food Program is a vital part of the community ministry network of the Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon. Our food program is a community-based response to the unmet food needs of our neighbors. We primarily serve the following groups:

- Families with children; over 40% of our recipients are children
- The working poor
- People with special needs, including the sick and the elderly
- A high percentage of immigrants and refugees

This celebration of Holy Eucharist is designed to be accessible for families with young children. Tool Time: Did Santa replace some of your tools this Christmas? Is your basement full of sad, dusty tools that you're no longer using? VOZ and The Oregon New Sanctuary Movement have a plan for those extra items cluttering up your house. They are creating a tool library for use by laborers at the MLK Worker Center. Many more folks could find work if they owned or could borrow tools that they could take to a worksite. Most wanted tools include:

- Hammers, screwdrivers
- Circular and jigsaws, hand saws
- Drills and sanders
- Compressors
- Blowers
- Tool belts, boxes, and bags
- Tape measures
- Lawn mowers, trimmers, and clippers

They also need to get organized! Suggested donations include hanging files, file boxes, shelving for books and binders, wall-mounting first-aid kit, Velcro cord wraps, small plastic bins, and recycling bins.

New Testament Brown-Bag Study Has Resumed

The Wednesday lunch and discussion group resumed on January 5 and will run through March 2. We meet from 11:15 am - 12:15 pm in the Parish Hall. We are covering the remaining eight lessons of the lecture series taught by Professor Bart D. Ehrman, Chair of the Department of Religious Studies at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. Each video lasts 30 minutes and is followed by 30 minutes of discussion. Topics include Paul's Letter to the Romans; Paul, Jesus & James; The Deutero-Pauline Epistles; The Pastoral Epistles; The Book of Hebrew and the Rise of Christian Anti-Semitism; First Peter and the Persecution of the Early Christians; The Book of Revelations; and Do We Have the Original New Testament? An extra session — exact date still to be determined — has been scheduled for a potluck lunch for fellowship and to discuss where we want to go from here. Please join us! EMO's Interfaith Network for Earth Concerns invites all congregations throughout Oregon and Southwest Washington interested in caring for creation to a celebration and gathering of congregations going green. The summit will be held from 6:00 to 8:45 pm on January 31 (display tables and optional tour at 5:15 pm) at Neveh Shalom, 2900 SW Peaceful Lane in Portland. This year's theme is *Food and Faith* and the ways that we can honor the abundance of earth's bounty and those who bring food to our tables in all facets of congregational life. The event will include a locally grown dinner, inspirational speakers, and a presentation from Neveh Shalom about their greening efforts. Resource people will be on hand to discuss a variety of greening topics including congregational food projects, faith and food, wellness and environmental health, energy efficiency, energizing your congregation, worship and creation, Cool Congregations lifestyle-change campaigns, and more. Come network with others and be inspired! There will also be an interfaith environmental advocacy training from 2:30-5 pm. Learn about key environmental priorities for the faith community in the 2011 legislature and how to be an effective faith-based advocate.

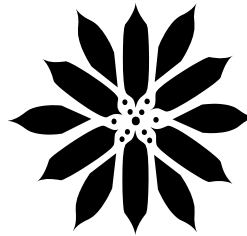
