



## ASSISTANT RECTOR



As we celebrate the Great Fifty Days of Easter and approach Pentecost, I find it's a good time to reflect on the program year. In this, my third year at St. Michael's (it's hard to believe!), I've had the opportunity to participate in the Catechumenate and see for myself why this process is so integral to the life of this parish.

The Catechumenate is inspiring for lots of reasons. First, it means that we're serious about the ministry of all the baptized. This is not a clergy-led program. It is a long-standing, months-long experience in community facilitated by a group of very able and gifted lay people, assisted by clergy as needed. The question being asked, over and over, is "What does it mean to follow Christ here, today, as my whole self, in this community?" We each have to come up with our own answer, with the guidance of the Holy Spirit, in order to take our place in the Body of Christ.

Second, it offers a weekly opportunity for listening—to Scripture and one another—reflection, mutual affection, and shared prayer. The transformative effect of listening deeply to next Sunday's Gospel reading, sharing from our own experience, and praying for one another can't be overestimated. The earliest church and the church in times of renewal has had cells that looked very much like this, and there's a good reason for it. At its most vital, these small groups of thoughtful, committed people are where the Church happens.

Third, very significant relationships are created and nurtured in the many weeks of the Catechumenate. Newcomers get to know long-timers and one another. Long-timers get an opportunity to reconnect with the community both as sponsors and by reaffirming their life of faith as the person they are now instead of the person they were then. The bonds between us at St. Michael's are supple and resilient in part because of the hard, rewarding work of the Catechumenate.

On Pentecost, we'll be welcoming the bishop for his yearly visitation, and our young people and catechumens will be confirmed, received, or reaffirmed after many months of deep work. Let's keep them all in our prayers as they approach this public affirmation of their faith as well as in the quiet, growing season that comes after the balloons are gone and the red clothes are put away.

Before a crowded auditorium of folks which included the Multnomah County commissioners, Alazar gave a speech outlining the importance of this work. Congratulations, Alazar!

I hope everybody was able to get to the **Ministries Fair, held on April 21**. It was quite a sight to see the large and wonderful group of people in the over twenty ministries which comprise Outreach & Justice at St. Michael's. These folks give their time and talents to a vast variety of endeavors, from food to advocacy to immigration to children's issues. Thank you to all who visited the **Bread for the World/Offering of Letters** tables at the Ministries Fair. Remember that you may bring postcards or letters that you wrote last week to Sunday services on April 28, and they will be blessed at the altar. We will then stamp and mail them.

At the **Meals on Wheels People fundraiser** on April 19, over \$8,000 was raised to help feed hungry seniors. Close to 150 people, including many St. Michael's parishioners, participated in the silent auction and wine-and-cheese event and/or enjoyed a fabulous piano and flute concert.

## GREEN TEAM NEWS:

### GREENFAITH CERTIFICATION PROGRAM STATUS

Much of the early work toward GreenFaith Certification for St. Michael's is taking place behind the scenes. The focus is on education, assessment, and planning during the first six months of the two-year path to certification. The second 18 months of the program are focused on carrying out an Action Plan, which is based on the education, assessment and planning done in the first six months.



On the education front, GreenFaith Green Team members are required to view webinars presented by GreenFaith program experts on a variety of topics. The first, and certainly a very helpful, webinar explained and walked us through the program's structure, processes, and requirements. Subsequent webinars have covered sacred texts that are sources of creation care and environmental justice and strategies for incorporating environmental themes into our worship.

Regarding assessment, GreenFaith provides forms to guide us through an information-gathering process to see where we are in our current efforts to be environmentally conscious and sustainable. There is no judgment in this process—we are simply given tools to help us understand what we already do well and to identify areas where we could improve. The areas assessed include the following: Worship, Religious Education, Spiritual Practices, Energy, Food, Water, Waste, Toxins, Ground Maintenance, Transportation, Environmental Justice Education, Building Relationships with Environmental Justice leaders, and Environmental Justice Advocacy.

Finally, the planning processes include writing a Communications Plan, crafting a Mission Statement, and, as the final product of the planning stages, creating an Action Plan. Importantly, the process for crafting a Green Team Mission Statement, which complements the parish mission statement, includes efforts to involve the parish as a whole. We started this process at the April 14 forum and will continue it through a survey and informal conversations with parishioners.

### WAGE THEFT AND WORKERS' RIGHTS (WITHIN A CONTEXT OF OUR NATION'S IMMIGRATION HISTORY WITH MEXICO AND CENTRAL AMERICA)

On Sunday, May 5, from 3:30-5:30 pm in the Nativity Hall, please join our speakers Marcy Haugh and Leslie Lambert as we:

- \* look more in-depth at the impacts of wage theft and worker exploitation of immigrants in our community;
- \* learn more about how our nation's immigration history impacts immigration policy today and the experience of workers in the U.S.;
- \* hear stories about the most vulnerable workers in our community affected by unjust working conditions as they struggle to support their families;
- \* learn about day laborer organizing, local advocacy and legal defense to protect and empower immigrant workers to gain control over their working conditions.

**Marcy** is currently a social worker in Portland and is passionate about issues pertaining to immigrant rights. At Loyola of Chicago, Marcy's studies at the School of Social Work specifically focused on serving immigrants and refugees through a lens of both large-scale policy reform as well as direct service. She co-facilitated a delegation in the fall for the Interfaith Movement for Immigrant Justice (formerly Oregon New Sanctuary Movement) focused on Wage Theft.

After graduating from the University of Washington, **Leslie** joined the Peace Corp in Mauritania, West Africa, where she worked as a health educator in a maternal/child health-care clinic. After moving to the Portland area in 2010, Leslie became involved in the immigrant rights movement and has worked on educational and fundraising projects with VOZ and the Oregon New Sanctuary Movement.

*The Bridge on the River Kwai, Friday, May 3, 7:30 pm*



## PENTECOST AT ST. MICHAEL'S

*When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.*



— Acts 2:1-4

Pentecost means “fiftieth day” and is celebrated fifty days after Easter Sunday. It is one of the seven principal feasts of the Episcopal church year. The season after Pentecost is the longest of the church year and includes as many as 28 Sundays.

One of the ways St. Michael's celebrates Pentecost is with a cake, a sign of our diversity and of the spirit who makes us one. The cake, whipped cream, and strawberries represent the foundation of the church, the mortar which binds us together, and the fire of the Holy Spirit. Here are some ways in which you can help make the Feast of Pentecost special at St. Michael's:

- \* Cut up strawberries on Saturday
- \* Bring an unfrosted sheet cake on Saturday or Sunday
- \* Dress in the colors of fire: red, orange and yellow
- \* Help with receptions after the 9:00 or 11:00 liturgies
