WE are rooted as an Episcopal Church, honoring our traditions from the creative perspective of our community, learning how to engage the bilingual and multicultural makeup of our congregation, and seeking silence and stillness to glean insight from the Holy Spirit among us.



We manifest joy through vibrant worship, beautiful music, and the active participation and nurturing of our children and youth.

We seek justice by advocating for political change, continuing our work as an Immigrant Welcoming Congregation, and striving to understand our role in social, economic, and racial inequality.

We embrace resilience by learning each other's stories, proclaiming the Good News of God's unconditional love, and strengthening our capacity to hope.

We live in love through our Baptismal Promises to welcome and respect the dignity of every human being, care for God's creation, and engage in the ministry of Jesus to bring light, healing, and grace to our world.



St. Michael & All Angels rests on the traditional homelands of the Multnomah, Kathlamet, Clackamas, Molalla, Tumwater, Watlala bands of the Chinook, the Tualatin Kalapuya and many other indigenous nations of the Columbia River. We acknowledge the ancestors of this place and understand that we are here because of the sacrifices forced upon them.

By recognizing these communities, we honor their legacy, their lives, and their descendents.

Highlights of the History of St. Michael & All Angels

1853: Several treaties with native people are negotiated that lead to the removal and relocation of the indigenous tribes that for millennia stewarded the land where St. Michael & All Angels is now located. White settlers arrive.

1914: The growing congregation moves a few blocks to its new location at 43rd and Broadway.

1910: Due to the efforts of a group of Episcopal laypeople and the bishop, the first church for St. Michael & All Angels is built at 38th Avenue and Broadway. First service is held on Christmas Day.

1922: Groundbreaking for new church, to be opened on St. Michael's Day, 1923. Old church becomes the Parish Hall.

1938: A new spacious parish house is built and the original building is torn down.

1953: The building is expanded to include the Nativity Chapel wing: children's chapel; and additional classrooms, offices, and restrooms.

1968: Ann Brown is the first woman elected to the vestry and becomes senior warden.

1979: With the arrival of The Rev. John Scannell, he and the parish become known for encouraging members to express their talents for the greater good, irrespective of race, gender or sexual orientation.

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OUR DEMOGRAPHICS

In the parish survey, 165 participants provided demographic data that gives a snapshot of who we are - age, race, education and so on - and our religious backgrounds, as shown in the following pie charts. See <u>appendixes</u> for full results.

61% of respondents have been a member for more than 11 years.

20% of respondents have children living at home.

67% of respondents have a college degree.

78% of respondents pledge to St. Michael's.


72% of respondents attend Sunday services weekly.

OUR WORSHIP & MUSIC

t. Michael's liturgical styles are expressed in our four diverse Sunday services:

7:30 am: Rite I, English language

9:00 am: Rite II, more traditional, English language

11:00 am: more contemporary, English language

1:00 pm: Rite II, Spanish language

This diversity not only satisfies different preferences but also has allowed many households with varied religious and cultural histories to find a shared spiritual home at St. Michael's.

We have also made long-term investments in being one parish with multiple cultural expressions, incorporating our English-speaking, Spanish-speaking and multilingual communities together in and beyond worship. Our Immigrant Welcoming Congregation ministry's 25 years of ministry throughout the parish and the leadership of our Associate Rector, the Rev. Roberto (Beto) Arciniega, have especially

strengthened this core part of our identity and built bridges between the English- and Spanishspeaking communities.

In the past we have created additional worship opportunities to meet various needs such as the Family Worship Service, which connected families with young children for one Saturday a month, or Taizé services during the week.

After several equipment upgrades, we now stream three of our four Sunday services every week, as we started doing during the pandemic, to make our worship accessible to our parishioners and neighbors alike.

Music at St. Michael & All Angels

High-quality music programming and leadership have been in the DNA of St. Michael's since its inception. Our music director's exceptional talent and skill with piano, harpsichord, and organ and her intentionally inclusive musical selections, as well as our choir director's expertise and exuberant leadership, make music a strong draw for visitors and parishioners alike. Our Coro and band, which serves our 1:00 pm Misa, and our

diverse choir programs, which include youth and adult choirs, also contribute to the richness of our musical expressions. Beyond Sunday liturgies, we are known for creative events such as our much celebrated annual <u>Broadway Night</u> and <u>Lenten choral devotions</u>. Our music program designs its offerings to share God's gifts of music with the parish and to help people to feel deeply invited into our music as spiritual sustenance.

OUR CURRENT MINISTRIES

As a community of Jesus followers, St. Michael & All Angels has long sought to live out our baptismal covenant through our ministries. Our mission to embody the fruits of the Spirit has guided us as we looked outside and inside to see how we might best live out its callings. Before the COVID-19 pandemic, we had a multitude of ministries, but suspended many of them when we could no longer gather in person. They have begun to revive or transform given what we have learned during the last two years; we feel a communal sense of purpose and joy, and look forward to expressing our mission in lifegiving ways. OUR CURRENT MINISTRIES

We Manifest Joy Through:

Vibrant communal worship and beautiful music.

- The pandemic's prohibition on gathering meant that we had to begin live-streaming three of our services (which continues to this day) until we could open up in the last part of 2021. We are now back to all four services.
- Our four diverse services, our talented music director and choir director, and our exuberant choirs embody the spirit of joy that runs like a river through our services (see separate section on Worship and Music for more information).
- Wide participation by lay eucharistic ministers and eucharistic visitors, altar guild, lectors, and ushers.
- A Labyrinth Ministry sets up a labyrinth painted on cloth for a contemplative worship experience.
- St. Brigid's Guild offers healing prayer one Sunday a month.
- Sunday Technology Team creates access to worship.

The active participation and nurturing of our children and youth.

- Children's Liturgy of the Word and Godly Play at Sunday services.
- During the pandemic, outreach to children and families continued via weekly emails, videos, Zoom meetings, and play rehearsals.
- The youth group, which serves English- and Spanishspeaking families, met virtually during the pandemic, but began to gather in person, starting at a local park, and have now moved back to the church.
- Confirm Not Conform Youth Confirmation Program
- Children's music programs feature choirs and special activities for young children and their parents.

We Seek Justice Through:

Striving to understand our role in social, economic, and racial inequality and advocating for and contributing to political change.

- Reckoning with Racism group convened to take a deep dive into the history of racism in Oregon, followed up with land stories of both St. Michael's and land where participants live.
- Advocacy Action Committee provides parishioners with opportunities to express their faith-based values and take action on issues of social and climate justice.
- Outreach & Justice Council disburses funds to local organizations working on social issues, including housing and environmental concerns.

Doing community outreach and service.

- Burrito Love feeds hungry neighbors one Saturday each month.
- On Super Bowl Sunday, kids engage the congregation in the Souper Bowl of Caring, raising funds for the NE Emergency Food Program.



- Gift cards and usable laptops were donated in Advent for Afghan refugees.
- Backpacks and school supplies are collected in the fall for distribution to school-age foster children.

- The Immigrant Welcoming Congregation (IWC) ministry seeks to deepen connections between our Englishand Spanish-speaking members and to support our undocumented siblings who are facing deportation and/or seeking legal status.
- In early 2020, the IWC in collaboration with Spanish-language lay leaders spearheaded a COVID-19 fund to assist parishioners who were significantly impacted by the pandemic, primarily due to loss of employment. The parish responded generously and over \$41,000 was distributed in 2020 and 2021.
- •In partnership with Oregon Health Authority, Multnomah County Health Department, and the language institute Edúcate Ya, the IWC ministry provided outreach and access to COVID-19 vaccines/boosters including four on-site clinics especially for Spanish-speakers but welcoming to all.
- Sustainable development and international outreach via El Porvenir, helping bring clean water. to rural Nicaragua
- Support for legislation for universal, affordable health care via Healthcare for All Oregon.
- The Environmental Stewardship (Green) Team recommends facilities improvements such as our solar panels.
- Youth missions and service projects establish connections and foster empathy.

Our Neighborhood AND COMMUNITY

St. Michael & All Angels is located in Northeast Portland's Hollywood district, an eclectic blend of businesses and residences with a lively, urban feel. Named for the ornate 1926-vintage Hollywood Theater, the neighborhood has a mix of coffee shops, restaurants, bars, large and small retail, highly-rated schools, a Saturday farmers market and an excellent library. It is served by light rail as well as three bus routes, and is only blocks away from I-84, a major east-west freeway. The courtyard at St. Michael's is the only semi-public green space in a several-block radius.

Like the rest of Portland, COVID-19 has had a large impact on our neighborhood, particularly in the substantial increase in the number of houseless people who need health care, food and other kinds of help. We seek to be a healing presence and respond to our neighbors' needs through our ministries. It is an ongoing challenge, but one we willingly accept.

For decades, we have been reaching out to residents of a nearby low-income housing development with biweekly meals of spaghetti and hand-made meatballs or a soup lunch. During the pandemic, we replaced those ministries with Burrito Love, a monthly event that allows us to serve our neighbors outdoors through all kinds of weather with nutritious burritos, cookies, fruit, bottled water and the offering of community resource guides. The burritos are prepared commercially by Super Torta, a restaurant owned by parishioners Armando and Kenya Cruz.

Making a Difference in Portland

Like the city in which we are located, St. Michael's is widely known for our social justice activism. Many of our members have participated in protests, and as a community we go far beyond that with our steady, passionate involvement in seeking to address crucial social issues. For example, we welcome and support LGBTQI+ people, including marching with other Episcopal churches in the annual Pride Parade. We have a long history of speaking out for justice for immigrants, including support for those seeking documentation and *Promotores* (community health workers in Spanish-speaking communities). We are an Immigrant Welcoming Congregation

and a Sanctuary Church. Many members are deeply engaged in services and ministries to marginalized and underserved populations and in responding to racism, for example, through our active participation in Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon's Common Table Action, "Reckoning with Racism." This is especially important in an overwhelmingly White city, with relatively small communities of color and a troubled racial history. Parishioners are also involved with promoting Health Care for All Oregon (on the ballot in fall 2022), an initiative seeking universal, equitable, affordable, comprehensive, high-quality, publicly funded healthcare. In addition, St. Michael's parishioners have served in many capacities for the diocese and the Episcopal Church, including the Standing Committee, the Diocesan Council, environmental initiatives, and General Convention. Our reputation for involvement and action is well deserved.



LIVING IN PORTLAND

As the largest city between Seattle and San Francisco, Portland is known for its vibrant culture, social justice activism, historic neighborhoods, and diverse food and restaurant scene. It has a first-class art museum and concert hall, smaller music venues, cultural communities, world-class women's and men's soccer teams, and a variety of festivals such as the Latino Cultural Festival and the Waterfront Blues Festival. Like other cities, Portland is now recovering from the shutdowns of the COVID-19 pandemic, the protests of 2020, and all the changes that came from both. Still, we were again named to TIME's World's Greatest Places 2022.

The mild Northwest climate with its cool, rainy winters and sunny summers encourages outdoor activities through all seasons: hiking, bicycling, skating, skateboarding, kayaking, golfing, fishing, hunting, skiing, snowboarding and snow-shoeing are all popular sports. The beautiful Oregon coast, Cascade Mountains and Columbia Gorge waterfalls are an easy one- to two-hour drive away.

With its 271 parks, the City of Portland's expressed goal is to have a park within walking distance of every resident. In the western hills of Portland, Forest Park is one of the largest wilderness parks within a city, spanning 5,000 acres. Closer to St. Michael's, Laurelhurst Park is a favorite site for walking and bicycling. One of the most "bike-friendly" cities in the country, Portland has established bicycle corridors through many parts of town, serving transportation needs as well as recreational interests.

THE DIOCESE OF OREGON

Comprised of <u>60+ congregations and ministries</u>, the Episcopal Diocese of Oregon is home to St. Michael & All Angels/San Miguel y Todos los Ángeles, and we are the second largest parish by attendance.

WHO WE SEEK

Then our rector announced her departure in October 2021 to take a position with the Diocese of Oregon, we started our search for her successor by asking three big questions:

Who are we now?
Who are we called to become?
Who will lead us into that future?

We answered those questions through small-group listening sessions (138 participants) that helped us frame the questions for a parish-wide survey (165 responses). Our transition minister also conducted one-on-one conversations with over 60 parishioners (see appendixes for a summary) that yielded a "State of the Parish." While the critical skills that emerged (see next page) are expressions of our needs for leadership as we move into the future God is calling us toward after the pandemic and this interim period, they are not all we seek.

As one perceptive parishioner said, we are "looking for someone who also will help shepherd us towards the Love of all Loves, who will keep that bright thread as a pivotal reminder -- as the reminder -- of who we are, of Whose we are." We need a shepherd, just as Jesus was, to care for us and show the spiritual maturity and groundedness that will keep us focused not just on what we do but why we do it.

CRITICAL SKILLS FOR OUR NEW RECTOR

Our explorations of what we most need in our new rector identified five key skill sets:

Communicates Well

We would like our new rector to be excellent at communicating to the parish about how decisions are made and other matters that are important to the health and well-being of St. Michael's, including stewardship and financial management. In addition, the position requires the ability to prayerfully mediate conflict, facilitate excellent group process, and connect with all of God's people outside the church. We want to feel that our rector listens to us, knows us, and keeps us informed about what is going on in the parish with transparency and clarity.

Excels in Preaching

St. Michael's has a long tradition of strong preaching that relates the biblical story to our modern lives. We have had associates who could provide deep dives into the theology and history of the church, and lay preachers who could relate very personal stories to the Gospel. We want and value preaching with spiritual grounding that is relevant to our daily lives and also comes from the heart.

2 Encourages and Develops Lay Ministries and Leadership

A strong and historic emphasis on lay leadership of St. Michael's many diverse ministries is crucial to our charism and to our ability to care for our congregation and our neighbors. Now that we are opening up again, many of us want to become active once more. We not only want permission to do so, but also to be equipped and encouraged. A consistent theme in our listening sessions and the survey was the importance of the rector's orientation to collaborating with and empowering lay leadership.

Is Committed to Pastoral Care and Healing Ministries

The listening sessions and survey revealed a greater emphasis on and development of pastoral care, which may be due in part to the significant number of seniors in the congregation. Although we are a corporate-size church, we feel like a more intimate congregation – and we like that. We want the rector to know and care for us, and likewise build a parish-wide pastoral care ministry to meet this need, engaging the gifts of laity in the effort. Excellent Pastoral Care at St. Michael's includes intentional and outright celebration of our LGBTQIA+ parishioners and their families, and creative bridging of our multilingual and multicultural expressions.

Is Good at Delegation

We want a rector who can work with clergy and lay members as well as associates in preaching, presiding, providing pastoral care, and interacting with the community. One member named it well: we want someone who is "a spark who ignites but doesn't feel they have to do everything." There also was strong agreement that the new rector needs excellent administrative skills and proven expertise to strategize for the long-term financial health of our parish.

Other Desired Skills:

Beyond these top five qualities, the people of St. Michael & All Angels also made clear that they want a rector who will:

- Be committed to vibrant ministry with and spiritual formation for both our Spanish-speaking and English-speaking children and youth.
- Show an interest and committment to working with and engaging in the life of the Spanish-speaking community by exhibiting mindfullness about consistent representation, inclusion and communication with our Spanish-speaking congregants.
- Lead the development of a strong stewardship program.
- Be passionate about social justice advocacy, stand up for justice in the social sphere, and be involved in ecumenical and interfaith activities.
- Support and value our music programs.
- Creatively engage the challenges in our neighborhood. The increase of houseless people during the pandemic exposed the need for training in assessing threats, de-escalating conflict, and providing appropriate boundaries while still caring for our neighbors. We must find and maintain a balance between securing the safety and security of our members and showing a loving concern for all.
- Be intentional in helping us recognize the challenges faced by our many LGBTQIA+ parishioners.
- Be focused on liturgy, both traditional and innovative.

OUR FINANCES, STAFF AND ORGANIZATION

Worship Attendance

St. Michael's attendance numbers, like so many churches enduring the pandemic, are tricky to measure. In 2019, at our four services, we had an average Sunday in-person attendance of 322; 2020 averaged 340 (January-March 8), 2021 averaged 130 (Pentecost-December), and 2022 has averaged 190. We have had a robust online service program throughout the last two years, which has continued following re-gathering in person. From November 2021 to June 2022, numerous "screens" joined us in addition to in-person attendance: YouTube (13,900 views), Vimeo (913 views), and Facebook Live (1700 engagements).

Overview of Finances

Our parish consistently receives \$500,000-\$600,000 per year in pledges from approximately 200 pledging units.

Our expense overview equals:

64% in personnel costs,

9% in ongoing property expenses. (Larger building and property projects are covered in a separate Building Fund.)

27% administration and program expenses; of this 20% is allocation paid to the Diocese of Oregon for our Diocesan Program Assessment (DPA).

Our Mission Endowment fund holds a principal balance of \$711,914 as of 12/31/21. The fund made grants totaling \$27,475 in 2021, and the total available for grants in 2022 is \$28,500. For more in-depth detail regarding our finances and budget, visit the financial report in our appendixes.

St. Michael's has an ongoing ministry team that facilitates the stewardship of the parish's resources. That group, Team L.I.F.E. (which stands for the many gifts and resources of the parish, including Labor, Influence, Finances, and Expertise), coordinates with the vestry and staff toward that effort. A dynamic, multiyear stewardship plan is in active development to help St. Michael's move into a new sense of sustainability following the pandemic.

Staff

Our <u>current staffing</u> includes:

- The Rev. Roberto Arciniega, Associate Rector (half-time) takes primary responsibility for bridging the relationships between our Spanish- and English-speaking expressions and for leading our 1:00 p.m. service in Spanish.
- Leslie Sackett, Associate for Children and Families (three quarter-time) is charged with oversight of St. Michael's childcare ministry, religious education programs for pre-K through fifth grade students, and preparation for Holy Baptism for families with young children.
- Associate for Youth and Young Adult (quarter-time) is currently unfilled; we are looking to fill this new position.
- Hannah Brewer, Music Director & Organist (two thirds-time) serves as choral accompanist and collaborative musician on organ, piano and harpsichord and oversees all music programming in the parish.
- Brian Fairbanks, Choir Director (half-time, seasonally) conducts the St. Michael's Singers, St. Michael's Choristers (youth), and the Saints & Singers Choir.
- Gloria Orellana, Associate for Administration (three quarter-time) is responsible for a wide-ranging set of tasks, including communications, database management, and scheduling of ministries, facilities, and volunteers.
- JT Quanbeck, Communication Director (quarter-time) produces the weekly bulletins, provides professional technological expertise, and coordinates the audio/visual and online worship for the parish.
- Jackie Van Anda, Bookkeeper (quarter-time) provides expert ongoing financial management and oversight, including financial statements, reconciliation, and developing the annual budget in collaboration with the Vestry and rector.
- Manuel Luna Montes, Sunday Facilities Assistant provides facilities support and security throughout the interior and exterior of the building on Sundays and at occasional public events.

Our Buildings and Grounds


St. Michael & All Angels is located at 1704 NE 43rd Avenue, on four lots; our building area takes up 19,400 of the approximately 20,000 square foot property. The main level includes **the Nave** (approximately 3,500 sq. ft.); **the Chapel** (500 sq. ft.) is up a half-level on the south side of the chancel. The nave and chancel provide seating for approximately 250 people. A half-level higher includes:

The Gallery (more than 1,000 sq. ft.), which unites the largest elements of the church (offices, Parish and Nativity Halls, small meeting rooms and a small single-use restroom)

The Parish Offices (one private office downstairs, three upstairs)

The Parish Hall (nearly 1,000 sq. ft.), which serves as a dining and meeting room with an attached kitchen which serves as the location for coffee hour between/after services

The Nativity Hall (nearly 1,000 sq. ft.), where forums, performances, meetings, and occasional worship services are held; the Library and smaller meeting rooms adjoin this hall.



A lower level (5,605 sq. ft.) contains the Music Room, classrooms, nursery/child care, two offices and storage areas, two sets of restrooms, and a mechanical room. A lift for people with mobility impairment provides access to the gallery level, main level, and the lower level.

The buildings were built in three periods, completed in 1923, 1938, and 1953, and have been well maintained and improved regularly. The most recent remodeling work was completed in 2011, when three new offices were built on the second floor and two small meeting rooms were created; in 2019-2021, when the Music Room and main floor restroom were remodeled; and in 2020, when solar panels were added on the nave roof.





A natural gas-burning boiler provides the building's main source of heat. The offices and smaller meeting rooms are heated and cooled by several newer heat-pump systems. Major plumbing and roofing projects were completed in 2018.



St. Michael's House (2,300 sq. ft.,) on the north side of the main church complex, is a former residence built in 1913 that is now used for meeting rooms and youth ministry space. One room is reserved for possible sanctuary use.

As an urban church, we have limited outdoor space and parking. The beautiful central courtyard is welcoming to parishioners and neighbors alike. A small staff parking lot resides behind St. Michael's House. Two neighborhood businesses generously allow us to park in their lots on Sundays, evenings, and at certain other times. The dedicated service of our Men on Wednesdays/Women on Wednesdays (MOWs/WOWs) helps us stay ahead of the upkeep, repairs and yearround grounds maintenance that keeps our property hospitable. They are often the first personal point of contact with our neighbors.

In keeping with a tradition of being a well-regarded centerpiece of the community, prior to the pandemic several community groups and organizations — in addition to our many ministries — used all of St. Michael's facilities. Several of the four or five recovery groups have begun meeting again, but other groups are just beginning to explore in-person meetings. St. Michael's facilities provide a vigorous focus for community outreach within the greater Hollywood District.
