

I ask your prayers for the welfare of the world:

For those who lost their lives in landslides in Venezuela, and from hurricane Ian; for the ongoing struggles in Puerto Rico; for those living near wild fires and for those fighting the fires; for humans and animals on the move because of climate effects; for all migrant workers dealing with seasonal changes.

I ask your prayers for those who are sick, for those in palliative care, and for those transitioning to new levels of care; for those struggling with an addiction, that they may find the help they seek; and for the friendless and lonely, that they be gifted with community.

Presider God forgives and heals us.

People

We need your healing, merciful God: give us true repentance. Some sins are plain to us; some escape us, some we cannot face. Forgive us; set us free to hear your word to us; set us free to serve you.

Presider God forgives you. Forgive others; forgive yourself.




From our ancestors in faith came Jesus, the son of promise to fulfill the law, embody your love and draw all people to himself.




