

The reader concludes Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.



Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God.



The Presider continues:



Annual Meeting on January 29

At the meeting, all members of St. Michael's will be able to vote for five of our outstanding candidates for vestry – four for three-year terms and one for a one-year term. There will also be an election to choose Endowment Fund Committee members and convention delegates. Members will vote to approve the 2022 Annual Meeting minutes and the Annual Report. Treasurer Dave Reilly will discuss the church finances and present the budget as approved by the vestry. Senior Warden Helen Crandell will facilitate the meeting with help from Interim Rector Sherman Hesselgrave. A further highlight will be the awarding of this year's "Unsung Heroes of Hope." Choral Evensong on February 1

Plan on coming to Choral Evensong for the feast of Candlemas (also known as the Presentation or the Purification) this coming Wednesday, February 1, at 7:00 pm. The St. Michael's Singers and Choristers are preparing works by Thomas Tallis (1505-1585) and others. They will open with the Service of Light, starting in near darkness with candles for choir and congregation as symbols of Christ as the Light of the World.
