

NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.


We thank you, wise Sister, that you walk in cloud and fire with your lost and faithless people.

The Presider continues:

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and maker of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. 
All Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.







Parking during tax season

Liebert & Liebert Accountants and Broadway Medical Clinic generously let us park in their lots during off hours. The accountants' parking hours do differ during tax season. As you face that building (4300 NE Broadway), the right-side parking area is leased by Broadway Medical Clinic. So that parking is under the same rules as the clinic's lot. You can park on that side after 5:00 pm on weekdays, after 12:00 pm on Saturday and all day Sunday.

The parking area to the **left** of the accountants' building is under the rules of Liebert & Liebert. Until April 15, we can only use that side on Sundays - not in the evenings and not on Saturdays. And please don't ever park in the four or so spots at the front of the building. Thank you for following these guidelines!
