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Dear Friends,

Last Thursday, the new vestry met for the first time, with five newly elected members: Lindsay Gutierrez, Ann Hargraves, Sundance Henry, Patrick McLaughlin and Susie Silva-Strommer. Helen Crandell was reelected to serve as Senior Warden. Carl Braginsky was reelected as Junior Warden for Facilities, and Sheri O'Brien was elected People's Warden. Dave Reilly had already taken over as Treasurer from Daryl Cole, and Becky Tooley as Vestry Clerk, from Marili Reilly.

The transition is in quiet mode at the moment. As I explained in last week's eblast, the new rector is in a diocese that requires a cleric to leave within 30 days of announcing that they are departing. The plan is that both congregations will make the announcement on the same day, when the time comes. Be patient. God is good – ALL the time!

As I was working on the beginning of the Eucharist for the First Sunday in Lent, a phrase I wanted to include in the Penitential Order leapt out: "You enter the desert to face the hardest truth; we live in self-deception." We fool ourselves into believing things are different from reality. I think it was Bishop Angus Dun who wrote that Lent is the time to call things by their right names. Sometimes that reality check takes real work on our part.

I will be with you a while longer, at least through Easter, so let us enter our Lenten journey with renewed hope and a mindfulness of the new chapter for St Michael's/San Miguel that is just around the corner.


In the first chapter, the author quotes Jim McDermott, an associate editor of *America: The Jesuit Review*: "I . . . wonder if a certain sense of failure during Lent is actually a good thing. In part, it reminds us that Lent is not a home renovation show. The primary goal of the season is not self-improvement; we are not here to fix up our own personal backsplash. We are trying to open ourselves to a deeper relationship with our friend and savior, Jesus."

COLUMBARIUM UPDATE

Work continues on the project to remodel and expand the Columbarium areas. The Columbarium is a ministry of the parish to parishioners and members of their families as a repository for the ashes of their loved ones. Funding for the project is coming from the Columbarium Reserve Fund which comes from niche fees and investment earnings.



Parishioner and contractor Brion Kimmel has created a beautiful new door which has been installed at the new entrance to the sacristy. This door was built to match the door to the Chapel on the other side of the Nave. Brion has also filled in the arch near the old door to make room for the new Columbarium cabinet.

The installation of new slate flooring for the Columbarium room, new hallway and the upper level of the sacristy has begun and will be finished this week. The lower sacristy floor appears to have some damage, and we are investigating that so that we can update the rest of the sacristy finishes. The electrician will begin work on new lighting for the hall and some outlets soon. Then all three areas will receive a fresh coat of paint!

ADVOCACY ACTION

The Advocacy Action Committee continues to bring social-justice and climate-justice actions to the congregation on the second Sunday of each month. We can be found in the Gallery during coffee hour between 10:00 and 11:00 am.

On February 12, the committee asked people to sign letters to the CEOs of Whole Foods and the Sysco Food Distribution Company. The letters asked them to eliminate single-use plastic from their food packaging. Members of the congregation signed the letters and were given a fact sheet on the harm done by single-use plastic as well as ways to cut back on using it. Just some of the ways to reduce use are shown below:

Clean a river: Rivers are direct pathways of plastic debris into the ocean. Join a river clean-up or do your own! The river will look better, and benefit its ecosystem and the ocean.

Shop sustainably: Next time you are out shopping, choose food with no plastic packaging, carry a reusable bag, buy local products, and refill containers to reduce your plastic waste and effect on the environment

Try a zero-waste lifestyle: Become a zero-waste champion. Invest in sustainable, ocean-friendly products-reusable coffee mugs, water bottles and food wraps. Consider options like bamboo toothbrushes and shampoo bars. These will help you save money and save the ocean too.

Travel sustainably: When you are on vacation, try to watch your single-use plastic intake. Refuse miniature bottles in hotel rooms, take your own reusable drinking bottle, and use reef-safe sunscreen without microplastics.

Be an advocate for change: Ask your local supermarkets, restaurants and local suppliers to ditch plastic packaging, refuse plastic cutlery and straws, and tell them why. Pressure your local authorities to improve how they manage waste.

OUTREACH & JUSTICE

Our 2022 Advent Giving Tree was a wonderful gift to lots of folks this January. Council members delivered a pick-up load of crucially needed items to *Outside In* downtown. A similarly loaded car delivered school supplies and other needed items to the *Community Transitional School*. A fistful of gift cards was given to the Syrian family trying to find housing, jobs, schooling, and a place within Portland to call home. Our hearts were full of thanksgiving to the parish for its generosity and spirit of welcome to all.

The Council has been discussing a focus for this year, and our thoughts are turning to Native American needs at this time. The Warm Springs Reservation still has pipes that will not carry water, and the Chinook, on whose land we stand, still do not have governmental tribal status and the benefits that would give.

There are so many other needs as well. Episcopal Relief and Development (ERD) is calling attention to the ongoing crisis with earthquake devastation in Syria and Turkey, and World Central Kitchen which is there feeding people. We can send a donation to those organizations and know that it will be put to good use. We will continue to discern prayerfully how to disburse funds this year, with gratitude for the opportunity.

COMMUNITY MEALS



St. Michael & All Angels' volunteers engaging in the community-outreach meals, Burrito Love and It's In The Bag (IITB) have formed a relationship with both our unsheltered and sheltered food-insecure neighbors. Providing our neighbors with these lunches and building these relationships form trust and demonstrate our commitment to being there through all the seasons.

In February 2023, these two community-outreach meals were selected for a \$3,000 grant from Central Northeast Neighbors. This organization is a coalition of nine neighborhoods which support community and civic engagement. The lunches have met these goals by engaging with a diverse community, promoting the strengthening of relationships, and building resilience through nutrition. This is the second year our grant application has been accepted by this group.

Burrito Love provides burrito lunches on the last Saturday of

CREATION CARE TEAM

Care for the environment has long been an important concern here at St. Michael & All Angels, and we are continuing our work of being stewards of the environment by establishing a Creation Care Team.

This is in line with the Creation Care Covenant of the National Episcopal Church. In support of the covenant, the General Convention passed a resolution to reach carbon neutrality by 2030. Our diocese also passed a resolution to achieve carbon neutrality by 2030.

In June of 2022, Bishop Akiyama commissioned a Creation Care Working Group to assist the churches of our diocese in addressing the urgent issues of climate change and other creation-care concerns. As a member of the working group, I will be able to bring ideas to the Creation Care Team at St. Michael's.

The work will be two-fold. First, there is the work we need to do here at our facility. The solar panels were a fantastic first step, but there is more to do. As the Creation Care Team gets to work, other projects will emerge.

Second, the Team will provide information to individual members of the congregation to help them achieve carbon neutrality in their homes.

Rather than hold monthly meetings, the team will operate on an as-needed basis. When there is a project to do, the word will go out, and team members can volunteer to get it done. An experienced grant-writer would be a great addition to the team, as would writers, researchers and experienced or willing-to-learn home-improvement specialists. 




FINANCIAL GRAPH & UPCOMING FORUM


