



From *Undrowned* by Alexis Pauline Gumbs:

"Pantropical spotted dolphins are synchronized swimmers and community builders. They travel in pods of hundreds, but within the pods they organize into groups of twenty or less and time their diving and beautiful acrobatics to be exactly in sync. Out in the ocean, they participate in mobile interspecies collectives consisting of other dolphins, yellowfin tuna, and seabirds. Scientists have different theories about why they do this, most of which can be summarized in these words: *knowing who they're with helps them know where they're at and where they want to be.*"

We recognize that there may be some ambiguity in this vision that we are holding out to the community as we regather. That is because we can't say that we know what the vision is – yet. This description of what collaboration looks like from the pantropical spotted dolphins helps us see that our hope is that we are learning (again) who we are and how we are doing and where we want to be next. Together.

Through a trauma-informed care lens, we need time to be seen and heard, share our griefs, express the places where we have felt abandoned or even betrayed by this pandemic, and listen for the possibilities of post-trauma growth. The complicated piece in all of this is that your clergy have gone through this, too, and are going through it now. We are drawing on the deep, interconnected relationships that were made possible by this pandemic and also holding those who experienced significant isolation. Our hope is that we can weave together these experiences into the building up of something profound and healing for us all.

This is why we've been emphasizing a time of rest and healing as we re-form as a whole community. Think about what we know about Resurrection. Did Jesus raise Lazarus to be exactly as he was before? In Jesus' Resurrection, he is unrecognizable at first; his closest friends must retrain their senses to be able to see him as he has become and as they themselves are becoming as well.

#### **ASSOCIATE RECTOR**

One of the primary sources we have for understanding how monastics engaged the practice of contemplative reading of scripture in the first centuries of the Church's life is called *The Ladder of Monks*, by a Carthusian named Guigo II. "The ladder" was



the practice by which monks considered the text before them and examined it with study and questions and commentary, but then also began to leave their intellectual work behind for the spiritual work of contemplating what was beyond the power of their rational mind to understand. One of the rungs beyond meditation on the text was prayer or conversation with God about the text, and one of the rungs beyond that was silent time with God.

I believe that much of what we do together in Christian spiritual practice is a way of getting to this place, a place where we may dwell simply in the presence of God and be strengthened and grounded there for the work and play of living to which God calls us each day. But we often need a little help getting there. Our minds want something to chew on; our reason wishes to "understand" the God we're supposed to be speaking



with. The "ladder of monks" was a way of combining all of these things, of sating our intellects with the desire we have for knowledge while releasing our hearts into a place with God where only faith and trust can go.

This is the core practice of our small groups which continue to meet on Zoom even as we turn to other, in-person meetings. It can inform everything we do together as a Church. At its core, the practice is to consider what lies before us—whether that be a passage of scripture, or an important decision, or a difficult feeling—to parse what we can of it and then, when our considerations are done, to turn to God in prayer and stillness. You can even do this right now, but it's pretty great in community, too.

Our next series of small groups will begin later this summer, and regular formation and education offerings will return in the fall. In the meantime, we can all climb the "ladder of monks" in our daily lives. We can remind ourselves that sometimes there comes a moment in our thinking or study or worries when it's time to put down whatever it is we're meditating on and simply be with God – God who is present in all things and holds us through all things, whether we understand it or not.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

As of the end of May, our pledge collections stand at 98% of what we budgeted; \$240,698 compared to our budget of \$246,665. I'm so thankful for the generosity of our parish. In preparing the budget, we had anticipated that the open offerings would continue at the same level as 2020, but we are seeing a shortfall here. The total to date for open offerings is at 50% percent



of what we budgeted. We have been given \$9,335 versus a budget of \$18,750. As a result, total giving is at 95% of budget through the end of May.

In the expense category, two dynamics are at work. Our total property expenses have not been reduced and are 3%, or \$2,900, over budget as of the end of May. While our electricity bill is lower than our budgeted amount by \$500, we have seen a rise in our natural gas expenses, some security charges and ongoing additional maintenance.

The other dynamic is that we have been investing in technology to better livestream our services and meetings. To date, we have spent roughly \$6,000 more in computers and other technology than we had originally budgeted.

While we are over-budget on the expense side and underbudget on the giving side, we maintain a healthy balance in our savings accounts and endowment funds. If you have any questions or comments, please feel free to email or call me.

#### SENIOR WARDEN/ VESTRY UPDATE

By the time you read this, the St. Michael's Vestry will have held their first in-person meeting since the pandemic caused us to move to online meetings and services. I'm excited to see everyone in the flesh instead of in the *Brady Bunch* boxes of Zoom.

Since February, we have been exploring our personal and community relationship to change through a group book study of Adrienne Maree Brown's *Emergent Strategy*. This challenging book uses science and science fiction to explore how we can shape change for ourselves and our community. We will continue through the summer as we imagine how to regather safely as a parish community.



In the spring, the vestry also explored St. Michael's participation in a new family homeless shelter program run by Family Promise Metro East Chapter. After much prayer and deliberation, a task group of vestry members recommended that St. Michael's not commit to participating as either a host or support congregation because we had not yet begun to reopen our building, and the timeline for commitment was too short to ensure sufficient support from the parish community. As a vestry, we remain committed to supporting programs that help homeless individuals and are open to partnering with Family Promise in the future.

Cliff Fairley was re-elected to serve another term as Junior Warden. Cliff has been coordinating the work of remodeling the Gallery restroom; please see his update on page 4. While most of the project has been funded already through donations, additional gifts to the Building Fund are gratefully accepted. You can donate to the Building Fund online or contact the St. Michael's office for assistance.

#### JUNIOR WARDEN FOR FACILITIES

The MOWs and WOWs (Men and Women On Wednesdays) have been hard at work all through the pandemic taking care of a multitude of maintenance and repair projects including lawn care, weeding, window-washing, plumbing fixes, sprinkler setting and maintenance, planting and pruning, awning installation, painting, electrical and lighting



updates, kitchen cleanup, and a lot of time cleaning up the messes left outside on the church grounds, which have really increased in recent months. There are many things I have not listed, but 10 or 12 people get a lot done on Wednesday mornings from 8:00 am to noon, and it is really remarkable!

As a part of wanting to make our spaces as safe as possible, Hunter-Davisson (our HVAC vendor) completed a review of our ventilating systems and made some needed small adjustments with dampers and outside air settings in early June. Most of our public spaces have strong mechanical ventilation. All outside air settings to the air handlers were increased to a minimum of 50% outside air. We will continue to monitor these systems and make needed adjustments as we return to heating the building in the fall.

Some of you may have noticed some work being done on the Gallery (main-floor) bathroom. Amy Valentine and I are supervising and working on a complete redo with new sink, water heater, toilet, mirror, light fixtures, exhaust fan, bathroom hardware, window coverings, paint and a new floor. Supply-chain problems have added more than a month to the project because arrival of the flooring materials was delayed. We are hoping the project will be completed in early July.

The facilities committee has not met since the pandemic began but will begin to prioritize projects for the future.

#### MUSIC PROGRAM SUMMER UPDATE

Your music staff has a busy summer ahead of them! Choir Director Brian Fairbanks is currently taking classes in arts management to expand his expertise. Choir Librarian Amy Valentine has been working on multiple construction projects, including redoing the upstairs bathroom at St. Michael's along with Cliff Fairley, another of our loyal choir members.

Beyond reorganizing organ sheet music, filing and cleaning the music office and choir room for the new season, taking a continuing-education class on music pedagogy, and scheduling and recording new music and soloists for the summer, your Music Director & Organist Hannah Brewer is planning and rehearsing an organ recital tentatively scheduled for Sunday afternoon, August 29, right here at St. Michael's! The program will consist mainly of 19<sup>th</sup>-century French organ works, many of which are either too long for church services or not liturgically based. Composers such as César Franck, Maurice Duruflé, Louis Vierne, and Felix Mendelssohn will all be heard along with some lesser-known surprises. If all continues to go well with pandemic recovery, the organ recital will be open to the public (with limitations depending on the current caseload) as well as livestreamed for those at home. We say a sad farewell this summer to St. Michael's Singers' bass section leader Alex Adams, who has been with us for the past four years and who is moving to the Seattle area. We wish him well on his musical endeavors and will sorely miss his expressive Broadway Night performances. Check out his solo in our last big virtual choir anthem, *Ev'ry time I feel the spirit*.

It has been a difficult fifteen months for choirs around the world as gatherings and singing have been largely limited because of COVID-19. Many choirs are having to debate decisions like requiring that every member is vaccinated in order to sing. Is it exclusionary or protective of the vulnerable? What about masks? Are they here to stay while singing?

As we continue to regather as a shared community, think about what music has meant to you over the course of the pandemic. Have you been inspired to see the creative ways choirs and musicians have continued to make music? Has it saddened you to be reminded of the separation we all endured? What have you missed? What have you come to appreciate even more about music and music-making because of the pandemic?

Remember, if you or your child has an itch to sing more (and be trained for free to develop your voice as a choral singer), please reach out to Hannah to find out about or join one of our choirs. #### **IWC HELPS COMBAT COVID-19**

One of the stated goals of the Immigrant Welcoming Congregation (IWC) is to accompany our immigrant brothers and sisters in their life journey. What we have learned in our 10+ years as a ministry at St. Michael's is that accompaniment takes many forms.

When COVID-19 vaccines starting becoming available to Oregonians, many members of the IWC experienced big road-blocks and hours of frustration trying to schedule an appointment to receive a vaccination. The question was brought up at an IWC meeting that if fluent English speakers with access to technology and hours to spend trying to get an appointment for a COVID vaccine are stymied by the process, what must it be like for our immigrant brothers and sisters, many of whom face language, technological and time barriers?

As a ministry, we agreed that we needed to do what we could to increase access to COVID vaccines for the members of our Latinx community. A subgroup of the IWC, with clergy support, reached out to the Multnomah County Health Department to see what we could do. MCHD agreed to make St. Michael's a "trusted community partner," thus giving us access to appointments at special vaccine sites for BIPOC folks.

#### **EUCHARISTIC VISITORS MINISTRY**



When you're laid up at home or in the hospital due to illness or injury, or for those who are homebound or in care centers for reasons of health or frailty, did you know that Holy Communion can be brought to you by either the parish clergy or our Eucharistic Visitors? The ministry of the Eucharistic Visitors is to bring Holy Communion directly from the altar to those who cannot be with the gathered community on

Sunday mornings or during the week. The sacraments are a vital part of the church's healing and pastoral ministry and as such, please feel free to call the church and request Holy Communion, especially following a hospitalization, surgery, serious injury or childbirth.

St. Michael's has eight licensed Eucharistic Visitors: Jack and Sue Harper, Terrie Ingram, Gayle Morris, Mary Myers, Ricki Perry, Charlene Sabin and Tim Sackett. The Eucharistic Visitors ministry is coordinated by Deacon Marla McGarry-Lawrence (retired). In addition to appointment access, the members of the IWC were given and took the opportunity to help at these BIPOC vaccine sites. They volunteered as flaggers, greeters and with check-in, all making a difference!



Within a few weeks, members of the IWC had reached out by phone and scheduled over 50% of St. Michael's Misa members for their first vaccination. In addition to St. Michael's members, the IWC collaborated with clergy at the other Episcopal churches as well as with VOZ, IMIrJ and other community partners to get the word out. Overall, we assisted over 250 Spanish-speaking community members with securing vaccine appointments.

#### **OUTREACH & JUSTICE COUNCIL**

This year, during the COVID-19 pandemic, the Outreach & Justice team continued to do God's work by disbursing parish funds to those agencies and ministries in need. We corresponded by email for a few months with those members who generally attend meetings and invited others to join us as we began to see the scope of what was in store for us. For the past year, we have been meeting by Zoom. We are now planning to morph into a hybrid meeting model, with Zoom meetings interspersed with in-person meetings in the Parish Hall. I think it was a surprise to all of us to realize how much we recognized the positives of Zoom, but we agree that sometimes the personal touch is needed.



O & J coordinated two projects this past year. One was to purchase items of use to those folks experiencing homelessness—snacks, socks and toiletries—and, with the help of the parish, we packed many gallon bags to hand out.

The second project was to work in conjunction with Advocacy Action to get signatures on two

initiative petitions seeking to limit the purchase and dissemination of large automatic weapons. Organized by Rise Against Hate, the petitions have been sent to the Secretary of State's office and hopefully will appear on the May 2022 ballot.

We in the O & J Ministries Council are so grateful that our parish has given us funds to allow us to do this work, and as always, anyone who wishes to join us is welcome. We meet on first Thursdays at 7:00 pm. Give us a call!

This summertime of transition from virtual worship to in person worship is an opportunity for all of us to extend Loving Kindness to one another as we find our way back home.



## ST. MICHAEL'S TECHNOLOGY JOURNEY IN 2020 & 2021

Fifteen months ago, St. Michael's was stumbling along, making do with a random collection of parts for our Wi-Fi network and various internal sound systems. Then came the pandemic. I am sure many of you know the drill as it likely happened in your homes.



First you start having to work from home, which you assume will only be for a couple of months at the most. It's a little herky-jerky, but you get by, knowing that it won't be long until you're back at your desk in the office. But it drags on, and on, and on. Eventually you must start making some upgrades because everything is just too slow, and you are not getting the work done that you need to. So, you make your upgrades. You get a new computer; you speed up your internet; you find a place to put an actual desk where you can work and finally, things start to settle in. It looks like you might just be in the place that you need to be.

And now, the next thing is that the pandemic panic is finally easing and going back to work is getting closer to a reality. But now, that reality is a little different. Does the office need you back in every day? Are you going to go back to slower internet? Going to give back that cool new laptop?

It is not any different here at St. Michael & All Angels, just for other reasons.

When this all began, we started streaming our services to Facebook by phone. Then, to improve that experience, we had to bring Wi-Fi into the Sanctuary. The necessary cable was strung from the main network switch in the copier room to the little cutout where the harpsichord is, using mostly blue masking tape (now starting to peel away). We got a video camera and started using some free, open-source software to stream to Facebook from an underpowered laptop. Then we realized that we needed to have a wired connection to the internet, not wireless. So, we added more taped CAT6 network cable to get the computer/camera setup next to the front pews. We needed some power there as well, so an extension cord was taped to the floor to bring power to the computer and camera. We got better mics to pick up the sound of the organ, piano, and singers.

Then it turned that not everyone was happy about Face-Book. We investigated options and found that we could use Vimeo and their proprietary software to stream directly to the Vimeo servers where it was then pushed to Facebook and YouTube. Happy times!

That is what we have been doing for the last several months and it has been working well.

But...as we started looking at bringing people back into the church, performing the Eucharist in a studio (essentially what we have been doing) was not going to work with live people in the pews. Bringing the Eucharist directly to our parishioners meant that cameras and mics and computers positioned directly between worshippers and the altar and clergy was not going to be optimal.

You might think, "Well, it's just going to be for a short while until everyone is back and everything is just as it was." We all know how that went.

The reality is that things have changed. While most people will welcome being back in the church, not all will be ready to jump in, vaccine or no vaccine. Also, we have extended our congregation to homes across the country. We are in people's phones and tablets. We are with them on planes. We accompany them on vaca-



tion. People are not going to want us to stop this just because a couple hundred local people are able to sit the pews from week to week.

So, we aren't going to stop. We are just making some changes that will allow us to keep our extended congregation. And these changes will not just benefit people far from Portland, they will benefit those in the pews directly as well. The sound system is being upgraded not only in the sanctuary, but we will also have speakers and mics available for use in the courtyard, in our gathering halls and anyplace we can plug in – like at a park picnic, maybe. We will be able to stream internally when we have overflow crowds without hiring somebody to do it. And we can do it all without putting cameras, mics and other gear in front of people and wires and cables everywhere.

Our experiences of the last year plus have pushed us all to new places and, while it is good to get back to something familiar, this is an augmented reality, with new opportunities and new ways of connection.


