All Amen.







COLLECT OF THE DAY

Presider God be with you.

All And also with you.

Presider God, you call us to watch with you on this line between dream and waking, sense and madness, garden and spoil heap: touch our weary eyes with tears to see that you are the place between God and fallen flesh: through Jesus Christ, the passion of God. Amen.

FIRST READING: Exodus 12:1-14a read by Leslie Tuomi

Instructions are given, and the meaning of the Passover meal is told: it is a remembrance and reenactment of Israel's beginnings as a people when they were saved out of slavery in Egypt.

The reader concludes Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

People Thanks be to God.

PSALM 116:1, 10-17



The choir or cantor sings the first verse. All join the following verses.

- 1 *I love the* Lord, because God has heard the voice of my suppli-cation, * because the Lord has inclined God's ear whenever I called **upon the Lord**.
- 10 How shall I repay the Lord *
 for all the good things God has done for me?
- 11 I will lift up the cup of sal-vation * and call upon the Name of the Lord.
- 12 I will fulfill my vows to the **Lord** * in the presence of all **God's people**.
- 13 Precious in the sight of the Lord * is the death of God's servants.
- 14 O Lord, I am your servant; *
 I am your servant and the child of your handmaid; you have freed me from my bonds.
- 15 I will offer you the sacrifice of thanks-giving * and call upon the Name of the Lord.
- 16 I will fulfill my vows to the Lord * in the presence of all God's people.
- 17 In the courts of the Lord's house, * in the midst of you, O Jerusalem.

Remember his admonition that what will be done for you is also to be done by you for others, for "a servant is not greater than his master, nor is one who is sent greater than the one who sent him. If you know these things, blessed are you if you do them."

And evermore they sing.



People It is right to give our thanks and praise.


Presider We thank you, desert Mother, for in the valley of dry bones you create hearts of flesh quickened by the Spirit's breath.

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself; and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and maker of all.


All Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.


Presider



The Presider breaks the consecrated Bread. A period of silence is kept.




