SERMON

NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.



The Presider continues

Glory and honor and praise to you, holy and living God. To deliver us from the power of sin and death and to reveal the riches of your grace, you looked with favor upon Mary, your willing servant, that she might conceive and bear a son, Jesus the holy child of God. Living among us, Jesus loved us. He broke bread with outcasts and sinners, healed the sick, and proclaimed good news to the poor. He yearned to draw all the world to himself yet we were heedless of his call to walk in love. Then, the time came for him to complete upon the cross the sacrifice of his life, and to be glorified by you.

On the night before he died for us, Jesus was at table with his friends. He took bread, gave thanks to you, broke it, and gave it to them, and said: "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

THE LORD'S PRAYER


Presider As our Savior Christ has taught us, we now pray,





We commemorate the emancipation of enslaved African Americans by singing traditional spirituals like *Glory, glory, hallelujah!* and hearing the music of the great turn-of-the-century African-American ragtime composer and pianist Scott Joplin.

Other featured music during Sunday's 10:00 am service includes an excerpt from J.S. Bach's monumental Mass in B Minor, sung by our professional bass staff singer Dan Gibbs.

IWC/O&J forum today

Please plan to stay after the 10:00 service today for a special forum sponsored by the Immigrant Welcome Congregation (IWC) and Outreach & Justice teams and presented at 11:10 am in the Nativity Hall.

In response to a resolution passed at the 2022 General Convention, Episcopal Migration Ministries created the Rainbow Initiative to spotlight forced migration of LG-BTQ+ people to the U.S. and the issues they face. At the forum, we will welcome a guest speaker, an Iranian-American with a passion for education and social justice. He will tell the story of his journey as an asylum-seeker in Turkey and eventually as a refugee in Portland in search of safety and community. We will learn about this

important issue and explore how we as members of a faith community can support LGBTQ+ people forced by persecution to leave their homes for a new country and culture.

Freddy Castillo, a member of the 1:00 service, is one of the *Nicaragua 222*, political prisoners who were released from prison and brought to the U.S. by the State Department on February 9, 2023. He was joined several days ago by his wife Karol and two of his children, Brittney and Marcelo. A third son will join them soon. The family is very grateful to have somewhere to reside as they begin building a new life
