

OPENING ACCLAMATION

Presider Without help it is too much for us. But there is One who has all power. That one is God. May you find God now. Half measures availed us nothing. We stood at the turning point. We asked God's protection and care with complete abandon. These are the steps we took, which are suggested as a process of recovery:

Step 1: We admitted we were powerless over our addiction; that our lives had become unmanageable.

COLLECT FOR PURITY

All Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Step 2: We came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity.

Step 3: We made a decision to turn our will and our lives over to the care of God as we understand God.





The Presider says

- Step 4: We made a searching and fearless moral inventory.
- Step 5: Admitted to God, ourselves, and to another human being the exact nature of our wrongs
- Step 6: We were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character.

CONFESSION

New Zealand Prayer Book

Presider Happy are those whose sins are forgiven, whose wrongs are pardoned. I will confess my sins to the Lord, I will not conceal my wrongdoings.

All We need your healing, merciful God: give us true repentance. Some sins are plain to us; some escape us, some we cannot face. Forgive us; set us free to hear your word to us; set us free to serve you.

Presider God forgives you. Forgive others. Forgive yourself.

- Step 8: We made a list of all persons we have harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.
- Step 9: We made direct amends to all people whenever possible, except when to do so would injure them or others.



Presider As our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say:



PRAYER AFTER COMMUNION




