The "O" Antiphon Service

An Advent Service Based on the "O" Antiphons

The service of Nine Lessons & Carols is one associated with King's College, Cambridge, dating back to the late 1800s, and has traditionally been sung here at St. Michael's every year in December. The service tells the story of the birth of Jesus through biblical readings, hymns, and choral anthems.

This year, instead of "Nine" Lessons & Carols, we are focusing on Advent (rather than Christmas) stories by incorporating the framing device of the seven "O" Antiphons, which date back to the 6th century monastic tradition. Each antiphon uses imagery from the Hebrew scriptures that are historically associated by Christians with the Messiah or Christ. Each explores an aspect of the coming Reign of Christ in righteousness, justice and equity.

Using a musical setting by Peter Hallock (1924-2014), the choir will introduce each reading with one of these "O" antiphons, so named because each one begins with "O" (e.g. "O Wisdom," "O Root of Jesse," "O Emmanuel," etc.). You will hear each antiphon first chanted in Latin with handbells, and then sung in English by the full choir with organ as an introduction to the chosen reading, followed by a relevant choral anthem and/or a hymn. We finish the evening with the singing of "O come, O come, Emmanuel," the most well-known paraphrase of the seven O Antiphons.

The structure of this Advent Lessons & Carols service based on the O Antiphons was devised by Peter Hallock and his colleagues in the 1980s at St. Mark's Cathedral in Seattle. We hope you will enjoy this new take on our beloved yearly service of Lessons & Carols.

St. Michael & All Angels, located in Multnomah County, rests on the traditional homelands of the Multnomah, Kathlamet, Clackamas, Molalla, Tumwater, Watlala bands of the Chinook, the Tualatin Kalapuya, and many other indigenous nations of the Columbia River. We acknowledge the ancestors of this place and understand that we are here because of the sacrifices forced upon them. By recognizing these communities, we honor their legacy, their lives, and their descendants.

St Michael & All Angels Episcopal Church acknowledges the gifts of sacred music written by African Americans, indigenous peoples and all people of color. This music enriches our liturgies, and we are grateful for these musicians. Music of oppressed cultures has been appropriated by the dominant culture without an appreciation of the pain and suffering experienced by its creators. We repent and commit to the work of racial justice and ending racism.
